FIVE CONTESTANTS, CHAINED TO DOGHOUSES FOR NINE DAYS, LIVE AS BLIND AND DEAF DOGS FOR EIGHT HOURS

**Players simulate the life of Ebb, a dog never released from chains,
who spent his last years before dying blind as well as deaf**

Altoona, PA—Dogs Deserve Better, a nonprofit working to bring dogs into the home and family, continues its first-ever Chain Off Contest at Leidy Park in Mundys Corner, Pennsylvania approximately 1 hour east of Pittsburgh. Of the 11 people beginning the contest, 5 remained chained on Day Nine.

4 contestants from Pennsylvania, as well as a contestant from Illinois, spent 8 hours simulating the life of Ebb, a blind and deaf black lab from Mahaffey, Pennsylvania. Ebb spent his entire life on a chain before dying in June of this year, without a family, love, light, or sound.

Contestants from Pennsylvania, Michigan, Illinois, Florida, South Carolina, and New York converged on the little town of Mundys Corner, PA to begin a contest like no other. They are living chained to doghouses until only one remains, up to a period of two weeks. They are competing to survive the boredom of this life . . . no books, TV, radio, smoking, or even visitors, except for members of the press. For only 1/2 hour each day they may see family members or call home, reach out for some semblance of normality. They are allowed the bare minimum in hygiene, no showers or baths, but only cleanliness routines undertaken within the confines of four tiny port-a-john walls. They are stripped of all the comforts we take so much for granted: in their place, they receive only a chain, a collar, water, food, doghouse, sleeping bag, and shade.

Don McKendree, the only contestant with a chained dog at his home, wrote in his journal: "My house is a low area, and it doesn't drain. Last night was the roughest night--it seems when you get wet and it continues to rain [there are] lots of mixed emotions--I could imagine the torture dogs must go through when people chain them outside. Sure, you can feed them, water them, and talk to them occasionally...but I'm talking about the feelings a dog has to go through but are unable to communicate. I sure am having a difficult time. I have been and done a lot of difficult things in my life, but being tied (chained) to a doghouse has got to be the roughest. Stripped of human communication ability sure puts things into the proper perspective. Let's unchain our dogs."
